Copilot tips to help in your teaching, learning and productivity

The following are ideas and suggested prompts to use with Copilot. Oxford Brookes students and staff have access to the data-secure Microsoft Copilot Al chatbot, available through a Microsoft academic institutional licence.

When using Microsoft Co-pilot, signing in with your Oxford Brookes login ensures your data is protected, in accordance with Microsoft's privacy notice. However, we do not recommend you upload any confidential or protected data or information.



Tip 2 July 2025 - Using AI to Streamline Presentation Preparation. Al can be a great tool to help streamline session planning. Consider using the following prompt to help generate ideas on what to include within your session and how to link them to real-world scenarios:

"Summarise key concepts from [topic] and suggest real-world examples that would help prompt discussion."

You could take it a step further by asking AI to suggest a session plan outline or common misconceptions within this topic.

WRITING WRITE SPACE HUB WRITING RETREATS

Is it challenging for you to find the right time and right place to get on with some writing? This year the Writing Hub is offering eight writing retreats, four on campus and four online, between May and July. All retreats take place from 9.00am - 4.00pm with an option for half-day attendance for the online retreats.

Whether face-to-face or online, the format is the same: writers of any style and level create a sense of community containing plenty of quiet space to make progress with your writing. The group reflects together on the writing process at intervals, and there will be a Centre for Academic Development tutor available to talk through any aspect of your writing with.

Participants consistently provide feedback on how much they have achieved on the day, appreciating the calmness of the space, the ability to focus and be productive, and the supportive, welcoming community. You might also get ideas for how to start a writing group yourself, as some have.
